## How to Prepare a Bibliography

A bibliography is a list of the sources that were used in preparing a paper.

- 1. Bibliographic entries are not numbered. They are arranged in alphabetical order by the author or editor's surname or by the first significant word.
- 2. Author, title, and publishing data are separated by periods.
- 3. No page referencing is necessary unless the source is an article or part of a collection.
- 4. Entries begin at the margin with all other lines indented five spaces from the left margin (called a hanging indent).

Below is the Modern Language Association (MLA) style of bibliography.

It is acceptable to acknowledge sources in the body of your own paper or essay as in the example below:

The jade peony, like a "beautiful, cramped heart," is symbolic of Grandma's promise to always be with her grandson, Sek-Lung (Choy, 1995, pp. 150-151).

In the bibliography, your entry would look as such:

Choy, Wayson. The Jade Peony. Vancouver: Douglas & McIntyre, 1995.
